Ask Dr. Jim....

"So what is your opinion regarding the impact of our environment on children and behavior/learning? Nowadays, home always seems to be blamed for everything!"

An interesting question as the first one to consider! Probably there are two parts here....with perhaps the most important being the use of blaming or giving away responsibility for how our children behave. As adults, we can only take responsibility for our own actions. With our children, we model and teach the kinds of behaviors we want. We always need to continually be challenging our children to assume responsibility for their behaviors and providing them with opportunities to have responsibility. While we want our kids to experience success, sometimes "failing" at something can also teach a valuable lesson.

The second part of this question likely touches on the nature versus nurture debate. Personally, while I am sensitive to the impact that genetics plays, I am fairly firmly entrenched in the camp of a parent's responsibility to shape our children in to the adults and citizens we want them to be. Nature sets the base for this instruction, but nurture can provide many surprises as to how our children are capable of overcoming many genetic obstacles.

Accountability Pillar Surveys:

As an annual check-up on the education system, the Accountability pillar provides an opportunity for Alberta Education and school authorities to ensure that we are equipping students for success. From January to the end of February, Alberta Education will conduct the annual Accountability Survey.

- In January, parents of students in Grades 4 will receive a survey from Alberta Education.
- In February, Grade 4 students will complete their surveys online at school.

All surveys are anonymous and ask questions about experiences with your school. In addition to English and French, the parent survey is available in Chinese, Punjabi, Arabic, Blackfoot, Cree, Korean, Spanish, Tagalog, and Urdu.

Your participation in the survey helps provide important information on the quality of education your child is receiving, so we encourage you to return your survey promptly.

Survey results will be available to school authorities in May 2018 and will be reported publicly as part of their 3-year Education Plans and Annual Education Results Reports.



Get the Scoop on School Improvement

Our goals for the 2017/2018 school year:

Goal #1:

Whitecourt Central School will continue to focus on strengthening literacy and numeracy skills to assist students in achieving grade level expectations.

Goal #2:

Whitecourt Central School will increase communication with stakeholders regarding programs, policies and procedures to increase understanding and how they influence student success.

Literacy:

All teachers, Grades 3 to 5, encourage students to pick “Good Fit” books. At the beginning of the year, students are taught a strategy to assist them to pick books that fit their reading and comprehension level which makes reading much more enjoyable.

<i>I</i>	can choose a book.
<i>Purpose</i>	Why do I want to read it?
<i>Interest</i>	Does this book interest me?
<i>Comprehend</i>	Do I understand the text?
<i>Know</i>	I know most of the words.

There is a 5 finger rule per page. If there are 5 or more words on a page that a student doesn't know, then the book is too hard. If a student knows all of the words, then the book is too easy. The same goes for comprehension. If a student understands everything, then they may need a more difficult book; however, if they do not understand what is going on in the first 2 pages, then the book is too difficult. It is a good strategy for students to learn and our students are presently using this strategy as they choose library books and classroom books to read.
